
FEDERALISM IN THE HOUSE!

Nigeria operates a Federal System, thanks to the 1999 Constitution.

What does that mean?

Power isn't chilling in one spot; it is split across three major tiers. Each has its lane but also works with the others to keep things smooth for everyone.

- The Federal Government
- The State Government
- The Local Government





THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT BOSS LEVEL!

This is the National HQ, handling all the big-picture stuff for the whole country.

- Seat of Power: Abuja (The National Capital)
- Governing Authority: The President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria

KEY POWERS (SECTIONS 4-6):

- Legislative (Law-making): National Assembly (Senate + House of Reps) - Think big debates, law making.
- Executive (Law-executing): President and Ministers - The Executive squad making things happen.
- Judicial (Law-interpreting): Supreme
 Court, Court of Appeal, Federal High Court
 The ultimate refs for legal battles.





Exclusive Areas:

- Defence (national security, protecting the borders)
- Foreign Affairs (Nigeria's global flex)
- Currency (making sure Naira is strong)
- Aviation (planes flying safely)
- Immigration (who comes in/out)
- Oil & Gas (the national treasure)

Why it matters to YOU:

National security, your passport, fuel prices, and how Nigeria shows up on the world stage - all handled at this level!



THE STATE GOVERNMENT YOUR STATE'S VIBE!

Each State has its own Government, Adapting National goals to fit local vibes.



- Number of States: 36 + FCT Area Councils (each with its own flavor)
- Governing Authority: Executive Governor

KEY POWERS (SECTIONS 4(7), 5(2), 6(2):

- **Legislative:** House of Assembly State-specific rules and regulations.
- **Executive:** Governor and Commissioners The state-level executive crew.
- **Judiciary:** State High Courts, Sharia/Customary Courts Handling state legal issues.

Concurrent Responsibilities (shared with FG, LG):

- Education (your school and Uni. life)
- Health (hospitals, health centers near you)
- Roads (those potholes you dodge, or smooth rides you enjoy)
- Agriculture (food on your plate)

Why it matters to YOU:

The quality of your local school, access to healthcare, the state roads you drive on, and even job opportunities in your state are all influenced by this tier.



THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT

THE GRASSROOTS GANG!

Bringing governance literally to your doorstep. This is your hood's direct link to the system.





- Total LGAs: 768 + 6 Area Councils in FCT
- Governing Authority:
 Chairman and Councilors
- Constitutional Basis (Section 7):
 Guaranteed by law, ensuring governance is super close to the people.

Key Functions (Fourth Schedule):

Markets (where you buy all your essentials)

- Motor parks (transportation hubs for your daily commute)
- Waste disposal (keeping your streets clean)
- Local birth/marriage registrations (your official records, no faking!)
- Primary education support (first steps in school for the Little ones)
- Local economic development (creating opportunities right in your area)

Why it matters to YOU:

Clean streets, local market prices, getting your birth certificate, community projects like boreholes or youth centers - these are all in the LG's lane.



SHOW ME THE MONEY HOW THEY GET FUNDS

Ever wonder how these tiers get the cash to run things? It's all about revenue allocation!

- Federation Account (Section 162):
 This is the National Bank, managed by the FG. All major National Revenue goes here.
- Allocations: FG, States and LGAs get their Statutory Allocations (their share) from this National Pot.
- So, in Nigeria, there's this squad called FAAC (Federation Account Allocation Committee) that splits the country's money between the different levels of government.

After taking out necessary deductions, they divide the cash like this: the Federal Government gets the biggest slice - 52.68%, the States get 26.72%, and the Local Government Councils snag the remaining 20.60%. Basically, that's how the national bag is shared.





DO YOU KNOW?

In July 2024, Nigeria's Supreme Court basically said, "LGAs, you're grown now." They officially gave Local Government Areas financial freedom, making it clear they're the third legit tier of government. Now, LGAs can get their money straight from the federation account - no middleman (aka State Governments) messing with it. That means they can handle their own cash, make money moves, and spend based on what matters most to their communities.



Why it matters to YOU:

This process determines where the money for your school, local roads, and health centers comes from. Understanding it means understanding the funding for your community's development!

TEAMWORK MAKES THE DREAM WORK

These tiers don't just exist in silos; they HAVE to collaborate for Nigeria's overall growth!

- Federal: Sets the big vision and national direction.
- State: Adapts and executes those national visions regionally, considering local needs.
- Local: Handles the direct, grassroots development in your community.
- Coordination: Institutions like the Revenue Mobilization Allocation and Fiscal Commission (RMAFC) ensure fair money sharing and smooth operations across all tiers.

Why it matters to YOU:

When they work together, everyone wins! Better services,

less chaos, and faster development for your community and the nation. It's about synergy!
